"Your unique set of personal traits and skills."



Some definitions



"A set of personal traits that produce specific emotions, inform motivation and guide conduct...to grasp what is ethically important in situations so that they become more autonomous and reflective....the ultimate aim of character education is the development of good sense or practical wisdom: the capacity to choose intelligently between alternatives."

"We believe that character is constituted by the virtues, such as courage, justice, honesty, compassion, self-discipline, gratitude, generosity and humility. These virtues:

- are critical to individual excellence;
- contribute to societal flourishing;
- can be exercised within all human contexts;
- are educable.



What does the research say?



Berkowitz and Bier, University of Missouri, 2005 (US study with the Character Education Partnership)

Effective strategies:

- a. Professional development.
- b. Peer interaction.
- c. Direct teaching.
- d. Skill training.
- e. Make the agenda explicit.
- f. Family and/or community involvement.
- g. Providing models and mentors.
- h. Integration into the academic curriculum
- i. Multi-strategy approach.





Character Education Partnership, 2011 (US study)

In schools focusing on Character Education:

- Bullying is rare.
- Test scores, grades, and homework completion go up.
- Attendance rates are high.
- Achievement gaps are narrowed.
- Parent satisfaction and engagement rates are high.
- Student engagement and involvement is high.



Jubilee Centre: Character Education in UK Schools, 2015

Over 10,000 students and 255 teachers in 68 schools across the UK:

- No trends in type, size or geography or school.
- Sport had no impact.
- Music, choir or drama outside of school.
- 80% of teachers felt that the British assessment system "hinders the development of the whole child".

The DfE's 2020 Plan

The Department for Education's 2020 plan has two key objectives which focus on Character Education:

- 'Educational Excellence Everywhere' wants all schools to "build character and resilience in every child".
- 'Prepared for adult life' aims for "all 19-year-olds to complete school or college with the skills and character to contribute to the UK's society and economy".

What are Ofsted looking for?



SMSC: spiritual, moral, social and cultural development

Overall effectiveness

Outstanding (1)

- The quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding.
- All other key judgements are likely to be outstanding. In exceptional circumstances one of the key judgements may be good, as long as there is convincing evidence that the school is improving this area rapidly and securely towards outstanding.
- The school's thoughtful and wide-ranging promotion of pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development and their physical well-being enables pupils to thrive.
- Safeguarding is effective.

Good (2): Deliberate and effective action is taken to promote pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development and their physical well-being.

Requires improvement (3): There are weaknesses in the overall promotion of pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development.

Inadequate (4): There are serious weaknesses in the overall promotion of pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development.
